New Police Sponsorship Program

A Proactive Approach to our Officer Shortage

The Village of Ellsworth is taking a more proactive approach to our officer shortage by enacting a new "police officer sponsorship program". A sponsorship program is an initiative where a municipality or law enforcement agency covers the costs of an individual's training at a Police Officer Academy. It benefits both the aspiring officers, who gain the necessary training, and the municipality, which gains qualified individuals to enhance public safety. It's a win-win! And thanks to a program through the Department of Justice, when the officer successfully graduates from the Academy, the Village will be reimbursed the cost of tuition.

Our first candidate for this program was hired as a part-time officer for the Ellsworth Police Department last month. Cedric Kosnopfal, an Ellsworth High School graduate, has just returned to the community after attaining a bachelor's degree in criminal justice and is eager to pursue his career goals as a police officer. He will be starting at the Academy in July with a graduation date of December 2023.

The Ellsworth Police Dept has been trying to hire a full-time officer since February 2023 without success. With the officer shortage, potential candidates typically apply for positions with multiple departments and get hired there (or poached after we hire them here). Through this sponsorship program, the officer commits to working for the Ellsworth Police Department for a minimum of two years, post-Academy graduation.

The police sponsorship program will be reviewed by the Village Board at the July 10 Board Meeting for final approval.

Update: The Old Junior High

Turning Our Largest Blighted Property Into a Productive Asset

Progress on the Old Junior High is still going strong. The Village has been working with CBS Squared, Inc (CBS²) and is now finalizing an advertisement for bid to demolish the structure.

We're taking all the necessary precautions during the demolition process. Hazardous materials will be safely removed and disposed of, ensuring proper handling. Furthermore, nonhazardous materials like concrete, brick, and asphalt will be transported to the Village yard waste site, where they'll be crushed and repurposed for other projects.

To minimize any inconvenience to the community, the contractor will take responsibility for erosion control, dust mitigation, airborne debris, and waste management. They will also notify neighboring property owners about potential disruptions prior.

We're expecting the demolition to kick off this year and be completed within the same timeframe. CBS² will be overseeing the entire process to ensure everything goes smoothly.

Looking ahead, the Comprehensive Plan envisions the site being transformed into



much-needed multi-family housing. This will not only address the issue of blight but also bring numerous benefits to our community.

The draft advertisement for bid will be reviewed by the Village Board for final approval at the July 10 Board Meeting.
