Update: The Old Junior High

Turning Our Largest Blighted Property Into a Productive Asset

You can't miss the activity at the Old Junior High site as MRD Group, Inc., secured the Village Board's approval with a low bid of \$481,470 for the demolition. Additionally, the Board sanctioned \$25,000 for on-site crushing of noncontaminated materials, an efficient cost-saving measure compared to offsite processing, significantly below the anticipated bid.

Kicking off in November, site activity primarily entailed installing security fencing, implementing pest control, and meticulously handling asbestoscontaminated materials. Certified Wisconsin asbestos workers utilized stringent containment procedures with 3stage negative air machines, ensuring no potential release of hazardous air.

The asbestos abatement, employing a systematic two-stage removal process, aims to conclude by 2023's end, with non-contaminated materials visibly present outside the building during the

The slated building demolition, set for mid/late January, is expected to span two months, followed by on-site concrete crushing lasting 3-5 working days, culminating in full demolition completion by the end of March 2024.

The Village's focus now pivots toward site redevelopment in alignment with its 2022 Comprehensive Plan,

earmarking multi-family use. To facilitate this, the Community Development Authority will craft an RFP for developers, prompting engagement in forthcoming meetings centered on redevelopment discussions and actions outlined in Community Development Authority and Village Board agendas.

New Ellsworth Public Library

We kicked off 2023 with quite the celebration moving into our new public library! The new facility has been greatly embraced (and used), seeing 571 new cardholders and around 40,000 visitors (we saw 23.808 in 2023)!

New Staffing Structure

We implemented a staff restructuring at the Village with the hiring of a Deputy Clerk, Marcy Kopp, in February, and a Deputy Treasurer, Cyndi Kern, in May. A

A big congratulations and "job well done" to the Ellsworth Police Department who has operated understaffed a majority of the last four years. By focusing on being an "employer of choice" and enacting the police sponsorship program, the dept will be kicking off 2024 being full-staffed!

Crossing Meadows Land Sale



Reduced Budget and Borrowing

Our 2024 overall annual budget was reduced by 6.51% and the annual debt was reduced by 65.80%. Each department reduced its budget from the previous year. A thorough review of expenditures identified opportunities for savings without a reduction in services. Looking Forward to 2024 Where We Plan to Focus This Year

Our updated Comprehensive Plan is just over 1-year old. We will continue to work through the outlined short-term goals in 2024, focusing on these priorities:

Board Strategic Planning

The Village Board will work through a strategic planning process to establish a mission statement and values to give clear understanding of the purpose, principles, and culture to guide and direct the Board going forward.

Winter Parking Ordinance

The Street & Sidewalk Committee will explore a possible need to update our Winter Parking Ordinance to better

align with the current needs of the community, and better utilizing the means of communication available today.

Façade Improvement Loan/Grant Program & Revolving Loan Fund

We will explore any opportunities to create a Façade Improvement Program and a Revolving Loan Fund as tools for businesses and property owners to improve their buildings or start/expand businesses.

Village Space Study/Property Usage

The Village will continue with its space study to help decide usage of vacant

space at the new library, the old library building, and the current Village Hall.

Old Junior High Redevelopment

We'll continue work on the old junior high site redevelopment by putting out a Request for Proposal in the spring and work through the selection process of a developer.

- Update to Village Ordinances
- Downtown Design Guidelines
- Complete Outdoor Recreation Plan

And thanks to a program through the Department of Justice, when the officer successfully graduates from the Academy, the Village will be reimbursed the cost of tuition.

Check Out our New Wheels!

You'll soon be seeing Chevy pickup trucks patrolling our streets here in Ellsworth. We've been trying to secure new Ford Interceptor (typical police sedan) squads through Ford for almost two years now with no luck. We were falling further and further behind with sauads that are in desperate need for replacement. We are converting a previous Village fleet truck into being an unmarked vehicle. In addition, we purchased two Chevy pick-up trucks through Quinn Motors for \$43,000 (2023) and \$49,000 (2024). Fun Fact: These new pick-up trucks actually get better gas mileage than our current sauads.

Here's What You've Been Asking

What is the latest on the biogas digester project?

The Village Board is still in negotiations with Bigadan regarding the Payment in Lieu of Taxes (PILOT) and a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU). Once the negotiations are complete the Village Board will schedule a Special Board Meeting to discuss the project and potentially vote to approve or deny the Special Use Permit.

It's worth noting that approval of a Special Use Permit will not automatically greenlight the project. This is just one step in a lengthy process of studies, plans, and other approvals.
